Objectives

- Promote creators, publishers, and vendors through a user-friendly, attractive, and competitive platform.
- Build a consortium of stakeholders to collaborate.
- Recommend cutting-edge regional distribution platforms that incorporate logistics systems and grouped shipping.
- Encourage a vibrant reading culture and the generation of reading groups based on centers of interests.
- Encourage the development of centralized bookstores within communities with populations exceeding 50,000 residents.

New Capacity Required

- Global Shipping and logistics to optimize costs.
- Determine monetization and e-commerce strategies to offer both near and long term (direct sales, referrals, etc.)
- Determine release timelines and key milestones of the project.
- Determine targets' **performance indicators** (number of visitors, regional coverage, transactions).

Project Development, Costing, Database Management

- Define the concept of the Unified Publishing Platform.
- Perform in-depth market research to identify potential partners and engage meaningful partnerships.
- Solicit current stock lists from stakeholders, ensuring a consistent format and encompassing essential variables such as category, key terms, language, subject, date, location, and available offerings.
- Establish a standardized format for publications data, ensuring scalability.
- Identify fulfillment providers for shipping and distribution.
- Develop a detailed cost estimation covering setup, operational, and marketing expenses.

Crowdfunding, Online Development, and Fulfillment

- Develop a comprehensive strategy, communicate the vision and goals to raise funds for the project.
- Design an intuitive, user-friendly interface showcasing Armenian and Armenian-related books (both in paper and electronic-digitalized versions) and publications diversity.



It's a tool that allows us to realize the potential of our diaspora and to take advantage of its richness. GRENOBL

On the other side of the Vercors Massif, Stendhal's city has been home to an Armenian church, **St. Gabriel's Church**, since 2012. This former Catholic church stands out with its modern architecture. There's a khachkar in Paul Mistral Park, along with a Genocide memorial in the neighboring town of Saint-Martin-d'Hères.

The grocery store **Erebouni** is located in the center of town, just across from the Musée de Grenoble. The **Maison de la Culture Arménienne de Grenoble et du Dauphiné** (MCAGD) and the grocery store **Arax** are further south, near Cours Jean Jaurès.

You'll find great Armenian food at Naïri, in Echirolles.

VALENCE

The Armenian presence in Valence is particularly visible, and the community is well-organized. St. Gregory the Illuminator Church was consecrated in 1953 in the historic Armenian neighborhood, where the Maison de la Culture Arménienne (MCA) is also located. St. Sahag's Church is a former Catholic church consecrated as an Armenian church in 1992. The new Armenian school of Valence is currently under construction next to St. Sahag and is due to open in 2020. There is also the Armenian Catholic church, the Armenian Evangelical church and the Maranathra Evangelical church.

Housed in the city's former law school, the **Centre du Patrimoine Arménien** (CPA) was established in 2005. Its permanent exhibit, tracing the

JORDAN RIVER

Fifty kilometers from Amman, you will find the site of Christ's baptism at the Jordan River. It is a UNESCO World Heritage Site that attracts many Christian pilgrims. St. Garabed Church was inaugurated in 2014 on land given by King Abdullah II to build several churches and convents.

KAZAKHSTAN

Capital: Nur-Sultan Population: 18 million Official language: Kazakh

Abundant hydrocarbon resources have propelled Kazakhstan, the ninth largest country in the world by size, into being the most developed land in Central Asia. The Armenian community formed in the nineteenth century. At the time, the area was mainly still populated by nomadic Turkic-speaking people, but the Russian Empire was growing. In order to organize these new territories, Armenians who spoke both Russian and Turkish became busily engaged in the Russian administration. During the twentieth century, thousands of other Armenians were deported to Kazakhstan by Stalin, but others settled in the country for economic reasons in the 2000s. About 25,000 Armenians are thought to be living in Kazakhstan today, mainly in Almaty, and to a lesser extent in Karaganda, Pavlodar, and Astana.

ALMATY

The former capital of Kazakhstan feels like a Russian city with its beautiful avenues, austere Soviet buildings, and trendy cafés. Today it remains the most populated city in the country. The Armenians inaugurated their own church there, **St. Karapet Church**, in 2007. The wonderful restaurant **Nash Dvor**, in the eastern part of the city, is ideal for a long Armenian dinner with friends. Another option is **Araks**, which is a bit smaller but just as good.

and the Armenian Evangelical High School. The Armenian Catholic Patriarchate, located on Orthodox Hospital Street, is the residence of Krikor Bedros XX, the Patriarch of the Armenian Catholic Church. The patriarchate's compound includes the Church of the Annunciation and the offices of Massis, one of the best-known Armenian Catholic publications. On the same street, the Armenian Apostolic St. James Church (Sourp Hagop) was inaugurated in 1955.

The neighborhood of Hayashen, also known as Karm al-Zeytoun, is a historic Armenian area on Achrafieh Hill. The majority of houses there were built by Armenian refugees in the 1920s, and **St. John Garabed Church** (Sourp Hovhannou Garabed) was consecrated in 1935. The Armenian neighborhood of Khalil Badaoui and its **Church of the Holy Resurrection** (Sourp Haroutioun) are set on the side of the hill that runs down toward Pierre Gemayel Boulevard.

BADARO

This iconic neighborhood, which was once home to the main establishments of Beirut nightlife in the 1970s, seems to be experiencing a second wind. Have a drink and a few mezzes on the patio of the Lebanese Armenian restaurant **Onno**, recommended by the Petit Futé travel guide.

BOURJ HAMMOUD

Following Armenia Street along to the east, you'll come to a bridge that crosses the Beirut River. On the other side is Bourj Hammoud, the beating heart of Lebanon's Armenian community.

It was the Armenian refugees that transformed this former swamp into a thriving town during the twentieth century. In fact, Bourj Hammoud is not just a neighborhood in Beirut but an entirely different town of its own. Mardig Boghossian has been its mayor since 2016.

The best way to visit it is to get lost as you wander through its winding streets. Bourj Hammoud is a special "diaspora experience" where you can easily find
